During our visit to Sudan, " Poultry' MENA Magazine visited "Al Qaris Agricultural & Animal Production" company and had a little interview with Al Qaris owner and chairman of board Mr. Mohammad Abbas Mohammad Ahmad who introduced the history and the field of activities of the company.

The company was established in 2004 as a company of agriculture and animal production on 123 acres with a Sudanese fund.

As for the egg production, the project produces about 60 million eggs per year. The project is considered as one of the biggest and modern table egg production projects in Sudan.

The farm includes 10 houses for breeding, the



capacity of one of these houses is about 27 000 chicks. The yearly production of broilers is about 2000 tons per year.

Al Qaris will expend in egg production as well as in broiler production as a source of protein. The government is about to encourage investments especially in poultry field. More than 200 Sudanese employees are working in the company and there are a lot of vacancies that Al Qaris can assure.

The first infection of Newcastle disease was in 1926, hundreds and thousands of books, magazines, and studies... were written on this disease.

Newcastle virus

belongs to paramyxoviruses of 9 kinds of serotypes (AMPV-1 to AMPV9). It is still the most important disease for poultry between these serotypes. All the birds are subject to infection, but the results differs between different types.

The virus is transmitted through respiration, inhalation, and contact with mucous membranes... environmental factors could affect the transmission in dangerous way.

The control can be done by applying biosecurity measures, preventive incubation against the disease to assure a good prevention by vaccination. Commercial vaccines available from about ten years are still used in prevention programs, noting that there is no effective vaccination program available without a high bio-security measures.

Intestinal diseases are an important concern of the modern broiler poultry industry, because of lost productivity, increased mortality, reduced welfare and the associated contamination of poultry products with pathogenic bacteria and/ or their toxins (Dahiya et al., 2006). Necrotic enteritis (NE) is the most common and financially devastating bacterial disease in modern broiler flocks...In the commercial poultry industry there are many management tools used to control enteric pathogens including antibiotics, vaccines, acidifiers, phytogenics, prebiotics and probiotics. Competitive exclusion (CE) strategies and the use of specific probiotics and synbiotics have been shown to be an effective means of manipulating or managing the composition of the microbial population in the gastrointestinal tract of poultry and thus protecting poultry flocks from infections with pathogenic bacteria.

From the very beginning of time, soybean is much known but its wild roots remain unknown. At first it was planted in china, Mongol, and Egypt. Many signs showed that Chinese and Egyptian are the first people to plant soybean and to use it as a source of protein in

human and animal nutrition. Until these days, soybean is part of the food of that region. Although Chinese and Egyptians ate a lot of soybean, the modern civilization did not use soybean until the last century. Through studies, experts discovered good results, by controlling inhibitor materials for growth that affect negatively livestock and poultry. The soybean meal became the most demanded sources of proteins in the world and an association for soybean producers was established (American Sovbean Association) in the USA. The world production of Soybean has been developed in crescendo because of the growing human and animal demand as a secondary product. Through industries based on soybean, many principal products like soya oil, soybean meal, and other products...

When soya seeds are delivered to be manufactured, the purpose is to get essential products like soya oil used in human and animal nutrition. The second product is the hulls, a product used in manufacturing animal feed for the high proportion of fibers in it.

Any individual or technician or even nutrition experts working in poultry feed can recognize the quality of soybean meal from amino acids side by physical methods. The decision is left to the laboratory technician or the nutrition expert whether the quality is good or no, by the reaction of birds in the farm.


